HEALTHY LIFE CONFERENCE REVIEW

n Thursday, April 13th, AACS' Upper School hosted its first "Healthy Life Conference" for students. This conference was birthed by our Student Life Team as an attempt to help meet the many social, emotional, spiritual, and physical needs we are seeing in our student community. To

do this, we invited Rev. Sammy Foster, head pastor at Lighthouse Church, to open and close our day by talking with kids about the importance of wisdom to living a healthy life. Sandwiched in between were four workshop sessions dealing with some aspect of social, emotional, spiritual, and physical health.

We sought to make this day look as little like a regular school day as possible. Students dressed casually, ate lunch all together in an extended lunch time, had double the normal "passing time" between seminars, and were given time to silently reflect on what they'd learned. Most importantly, students had the freedom to attend the workshop sessions they felt would be most beneficial to their growth. These workshops were facilitated largely by faculty and staff members, although we also had presenters from the lower and middle schools, as well as several AACS parents and local church leaders. The workshops covered such topics as anxiety & depression, rest/relaxation, healthy dating, pornography, handling conflict, fear, establishing boundaries,

and learning to see others as God sees them.

The purpose of the conference was to further explore our year-long theme of "the Good Life" by examining what it means to live in healthy relationship with oneself and others. We know that so many of our kids – and so many of us – struggle to live healthy, balanced lives that are properly ordered with

Christ at the center. Our goal was to help our students see how God's truth reaches beneath the surface and speaks into every part of our lives – not only our spiritual lives, but our emotional, social, and physical lives as well. Providentially, the conference was held the Thursday before Easter, and we tried to help kids realize in a new way how our Lord's resurrection not only grants us eternal life, but also seeks to bring

healing and restoration to all of life in the here and now.

It was such a blessing to be able to both teach, and learn alongside, students in an environment that was different from a typical school day. We heard many positive reports from kids that the day itself – and especially the workshops they attended – both challenged and encouraged them. To Him be the glory!





Change is inevitable and we should expect it. From retirements to seniors graduating to families moving in and out of the state, the make-up and landscape of Annapolis Area Christian School changes constantly. And yet, there is a foundational constant among us: our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Danny and Minna both shared a bit about how God brought them to a career in medicine, and how they each see the Lord leading them in the years ahead.



THOUGHTS FROM MINNA:

I first felt the Lord pulling on my heart to consider a career in medicine during my junior year of high school. In the midst of the stress of A.P. U.S. History, and the excitement of prom dress shopping - the typical experiences of junior year - I also lost both of my grandmothers within a five month span.

Spending so much time in the hospital and around sick individuals whom I loved definitely made an impression on me, especially during such a formative time of life. As years went by, I grew in my love for science and compassion for the sick, in addition to growing in confidence that the Lord was leading me to become a physician. I am so grateful for my time at AACS, which encouraged me to pursue excellence for the Lord's glory. In addition, after graduation I carried with me the importance of engaging culture for the sake of the gospel. I think back on my Senior Practicum project, and on Mr. Scheidt's senior year Bible class, and on the many discussions on how the gospel affects how we live and act when living and working in a secular culture. I'm still not sure what kind of doctor I'm going to be or what specifically God has in store for me in the years to come, but I feel so blessed to be able to serve the sick and represent healing to the people around me.

THOUGHTS FROM DANNY:

My professional journey was nuanced. I first pursued a career in politics with the support and encouragement of Mrs. Jane Brown – a paragon and mentor who I can almost hear talking about political situations as I think about them (I would love to hear her talking about the political scene today). With time I grew frustrated with the direction that politics has taken and the difficulty of any meaningful policy changes and developments. As these thoughts were solidifying, I was interning on the Ehrlich campaign which overlooked the

hospital. Those long hours coincided with dreams of applying my labor in ways that were more immediately helpful. The view out my window was hard to ignore and served as an object of intense reflection and prayer. Today,

I remember back to when I thanked Mrs. Degenford profusely for the 5 on the AP Bio exam that would allow me to never take science again. It makes me chuckle. I loved science, but it took some real intervention to reveal it as my calling. As I have continued on I became acquainted with Dr. Adrian Park, a man who has become a giant in my life. I knew he was a doctor, I didn't realize he was a doctor's doctor. My acquaintance with Dr. Park is humbling as I consider where I would be without his direction and grounded yet inspiring advice that is always firmly centered on Christ and calling. This type of relationship is a special type of discipleship that comes rarely. AACS made me who I am. Its teachers gave me the guidance and moral decision-making capacity that I have. Most meaningful people in my life are related to it in some way. I'm thankful for both its impact and the opportunities it continues to open. [†]


