This morning I had coffee with a couple of our school dads who I met during my first year here back in the fall of 2012. Their

kids are moving along on their educational journey at AACs, and will be AACs lifers (attended K-12) at the end of their experience. They wanted to talk about the last six school years. The paragraph below surfaced the answers to most of their initial questions. I tried to thoughtfully respond and as best as possible recall the numbers connected to some of their questions, along with more strategic outcomes that they were curious about. The stats and the more programmatic outcomes speak for themselves. But, at the end of their historical "interrogation" (Don't worry it was 100% friendly), I needed to speak to what has driven, and will continue to drive me in the years ahead.

What I explained to them was what I stated back when I was being interviewed and in all of my initial queries...my deal is Christ and kids. Our mission speaks specifically to those priorities, and that only happens when our school culture is aligned and focused on both Jesus Christ and our students. So for me, the recollections of these past six school years are filled with people...with relationships. My mind's eye is drawn to the amazing faculty and staff that engages our students every day. I see their sacrifice and I see their visible faith being played out in their relationships with our students, our school parents and their teammates. I am also drawn to the scores of students that I have been blessed to know well.

I love our kids. I am inspired by them every day. I was moved to tears this past week at our 8th grade chapel and I was similarly challenged at our senior chapel.

We exist because of Jesus and for kids...and that should say it all.

Yes, we have accomplished much over the past six years and our next phase of strategic planning and school accreditation will provide us with the vision of what lies ahead for AACs. But please know that it is our relationships that matter most.

First and foremost with Jesus, and then with the students, families, faculty/staff who God sends us each and every year. We do stand on the verge of a season of great opportunity. If pursued with our missional priorities inspiring our efforts, then I believe God has some amazing plans for our future.

As I began this article, my "Coffee Buddies" had some specific questions, and yes, much has been accomplished. Just don't miss the two paragraphs that precede this one. We've completed our five year Strategic Plan that was published in January 2013. Our School Accreditation Term that was initiated in the Spring of 2013 is complete. We've opened a new lower school in Severn. We've seen the development and implementation of a K-12 Educational Support Program. Enrollment has grown from a low of 781 to an anticipated enrollment of 935 for school year 2018-2019. To be reminded about The NOW WHAT?, re-read those two center paragraphs. ⚓

This year marks the third year of our SLS campus. We continue to grow in enrollment, and this year we were able to expand our school-wide Educational Support Program to our campus at SLS.

Our K-12 Educational Support Program is led by Carolyn Beall. She has been helping the SLS in our first two years. This year we added an Educational Support Teacher, Emily Williams. A Tribute to Rick Slenk, MS Principal

The doors of Annapolis Area Christian School opened in 1971 with three teachers and 32 students in grades K-3. The school flourished and grew, reaching a milestone in 1985 when 12 students had the distinction of becoming Annapolis Area Christian School's first high school graduates. Rick Slenk, who began teaching in 1981 and taught those first graduates 9th-12th grade History, has been involved in the school's phenomenal growth over the last 37 years.

Yes, Rick has served AACs for thirty-seven years!

When we were planning how we could best celebrate a career that has spanned almost four decades and deeply impacted our school community, Lori Slenk came up with a slogan we loved - "It's the end of an era!" But that is technically true only for Rick and Lori, who go forth at the end of June to do God's work in new and exciting ways. For the rest of the AACs community, we are blessed by the legacy left by this godly man's humble, faithful service. And the "era" of Christian education at AACs will continue, God willing, for many more decades, thanks in great part to leadership like Rick's.

First and foremost, one of Rick's greatest legacies is his clear understanding of the distinctives of Christian Education and his mentoring of Middle School teachers in understanding how to integrate faith formation with an excellent, rigorous educational program. This integration organically results in a beautiful community that loves God and one another through a mutual love of Christ. Another related legacy is how Rick goes about mentoring teachers and staff at the middle school; his approach to professional development through the nurturing of a Christian collegiate culture led by God's Spirit has been the soil from which almost everything else grows. He has taught us to ask good questions and has modeled a desire to continually ask ourselves how we can serve our students and families best, and to answer those questions together in ways that are intentional and programmatic. He has provided a summer Conclave for teachers for 17 years, an intensive three-day professional retreat to reconnect and dive into professional development and planning for the upcoming year. Out of his leadership in understanding Christian Education and through a nurturing professional community of believers, much has been accomplished at the Middle School over the last 20 years.

One of Rick's first efforts was to organize the Middle School into grade level teaching teams that specialize in their



students' developmental needs intellectually, socially and spiritually, and he has ensured over the years that teaching teams are given the time and resources necessary to plan faith-based integrated learning together. The fruit of this "best practice" organizational structure has been impressive. The Middle School implemented AACs' first one-to-one laptop program after several years of study and preparation under Rick's wise leadership. Teachers have mapped curriculum, embraced project-based learning, increased STEM opportunities, kept abreast of brain-based research and its educational implications, wrestled with a digital invasion, worked tirelessly with students to help them create a genuine Christian culture they can call their own, helped develop a Biblical view of our approach to students with learning differences, and developed a student-centric worship program that engages students in authentic expressions of

their love of Christ and what they are learning about following Him in their daily lives.

Interestingly, when I spoke with teachers about Rick's legacy in preparation for writing about it, very few responded first by noting those impressive Middle School accomplishments. They all spoke first about the impact Rick has had on them personally, professionally and in community as a godly man, a man who loves God, loves to worship God, and who shows us in his daily life what it "looks like" to be a Christian leader. Two years ago, Rick worked on the executive committee that labored to articulate our core values at AACCS, and when those values were published, those of us who know Rick realized that he not only understands our core values, he embodies them: visible faith, courageous humility, steadfast joy, healthy discontent. He "is" our core values, and his leadership in expressing so beautifully our essential identity as Christian educators is sure to be one of the legacies that will guide AACCS as we continue to navigate the myriad of changes in a post-Christian world. †

AACS SENIOR ACHIEVES TOP 1% OF ACT AND SAT SCORES

Evan Robertson has been a standout AACs student since he arrived in sixth grade and finished his tenure as Valedictorian of his graduating class on May 24, 2018. One of his most impressive accomplishments is that both his SAT and his ACT scores were in the top 1% of the country. Evan also is one of the very few students in AACs history to score a 5 out of 5 on all his AP exams!

In the summer of 2017, Evan was selected to participate in both the United States Air Force Academy and United States Naval Academy Summer Seminars. In September, Evan was named a Commended Student in the 2018 National Merit Scholarship Program. About 34,000 Commended Students throughout the nation were recognized for their exceptional academic promise. Commended Students placed among the top 50,000 scorers of more than 1.6 million students who entered the 2018 competition by taking the 2016 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT).

Caleb Robertson, AACs Class of 2014, and Luke Robertson, AACs Class of 2016, are Evan's older brothers and both attend the U.S. Naval Academy. His father is also a Naval Academy graduate. After weighing his many options, Evan has decided to make his own mark on the U.S. Naval Academy where he will attend this fall.

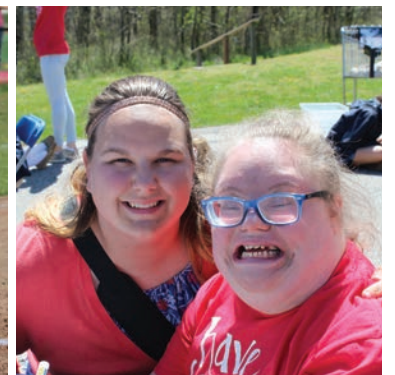

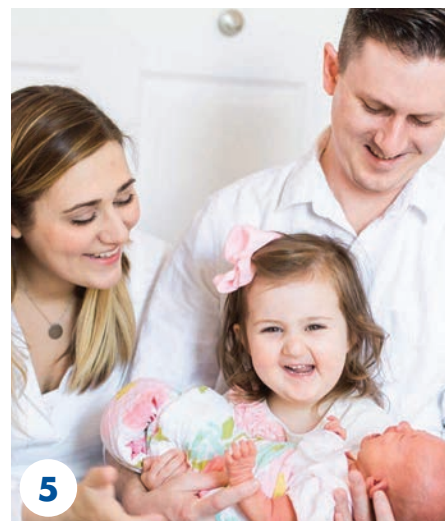

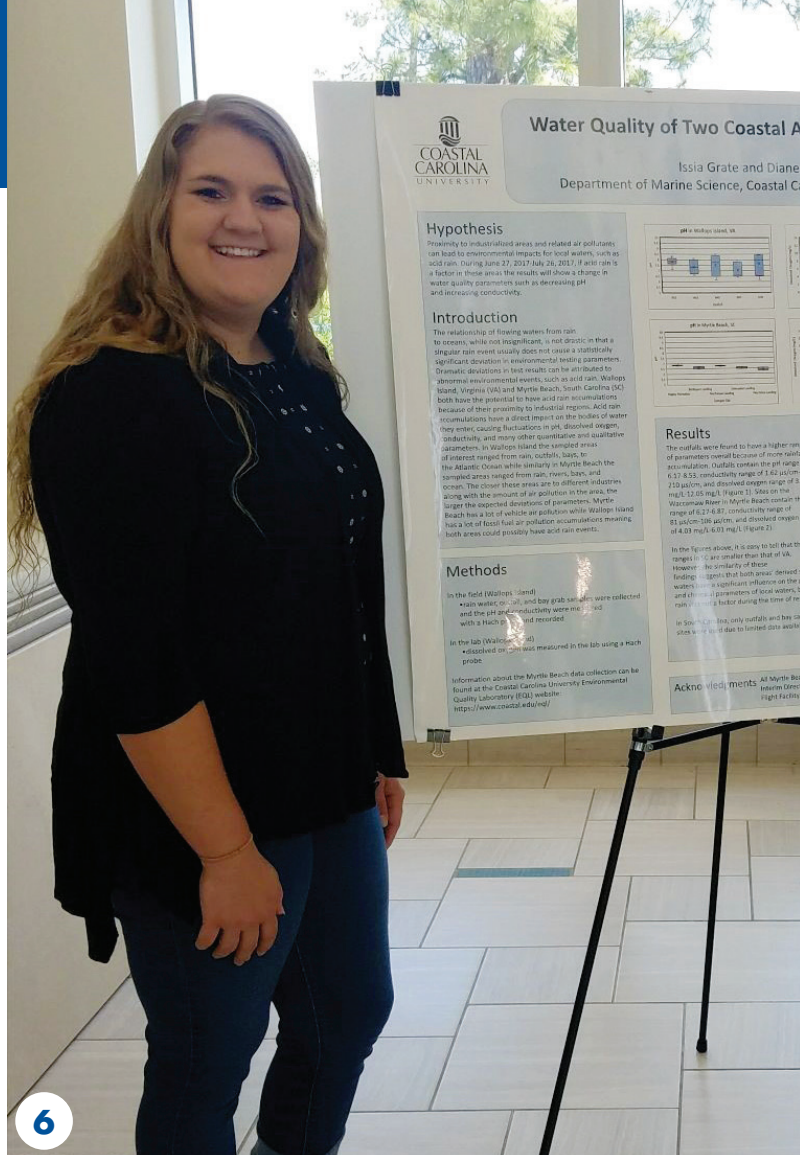
